#### RE: GAS TAX AGREEMENT COMMUNITY WORKS FUND PAYMENT

I am pleased to advise that UBCM is in the process of distributing the second of two Community Works Fund (CWF) payments for fiscal 2013/2014. Please be advised that this is the final payment under the current Gas Tax Agreement's Community Works Fund program. An electronic transfer of \$101,999.81 is expected to occur on **Tuesday**, **November 26<sup>th</sup>**. These payments are made in accordance with the payment schedule set out in your CWF Agreement with UBCM (see Addendum #1 of your Agreement).

CWF are made available to eligible local governments by the Government of Canada pursuant to the Agreement on the Transfer of Federal Gas Tax Revenues between UBCM and the governments of Canada and British Columbia. Funding under the program may be directed to local priorities that fall within one of the eligible project categories and that are in keeping with the Agreement's intended outcomes of reduced greenhouse gas emissions, cleaner air and cleaner water.

Dear Mayor Parnham:

Thank you for your letter dated August 27, 2013 and for meeting with me on September 30<sup>th</sup>, 2013 regarding the creation of two integrated community care facilities, one in Port Hardy and one in Port McNeill.

As we discussed, Island Health remains committed to a sustainable building option for integrated primary health care facilities in both Port Hardy and Port McNeill, starting with Port Hardy as recommended to Island Health by the Local Working Group in Recommendation 32 of its report. This model will provide patients with access to integrated health care teams providing a range of services under one roof and will enhance accessible and sustainable health care services in the community.

Progress has been made in the planning for the new facility in Port Hardy. A functional plan for an integrated facility has been completed and is being compared with the lessons learned from the Oceanside Health Centre (OHC) project in Parksville. The next step will be development of the business case and in particular the procurement options.

The timing for taking this project to the market will be based on affordability. As is the case with most publicly funded institutions, Island Health must work within limited fiscal resources. I can assure you that this project will be brought forward for prioritization for 2014/15, but there is no assurance that funding will be available. For the purposes of clarification, the OHC project took roughly five years from concept to completion.

Although the ultimate goal for Port Hardy is development of an integrated primary health care facility, progress is being made through two initiatives. The first initiative is the purchase of an existing medical clinic and plans to build additional space so all primary care physicians and nurse practitioners can be integrated as one team. This facility will also support efforts to recruit physicians to Port Hardy. Funding has been approved to purchase this property and, subject to any unforeseen issues, Island Health is working through the final approvals to make this a reality.

The second initiative is the development of virtual teams as noted in the Island Health response to Recommendation 32 of the Local Working Group's report. This step will review opportunities to achieve efficiencies and health care benefits beyond what will be achieved with the integration of the primary care physicians and nurse practitioners achieved in the first initiative.

Please be assured that Island Health recognizes the urgency to move forward with measures to support services and care in the Mount Waddington community. I would also like to thank you and other members of the Local Working Group for the tremendous amount of time and effort you have put into planning health improvements in the region.

#### 6. Staff Reports

AIRPORT WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT Airport Wastewater Treatment Plant (AWWTP) — T. Kushner report The Committee discussed at length the report submitted by Trevor Kushner dated November 15, 2013 regarding the Airport Wastewater Treatment Plant — Outfall.

T. Kushner advised that the AWWTP and out fall are out of compliance with the District of Liquid Waste Management Plan (LWMP) as submitted to the Ministry of Environment (MOE) and has been for sometime. The MOE has been understanding but is now requiring that the problems be addressed.

The following options and benefits from the report were reviewed.

#### Options:

- 1.Status Quo
- Do nothing.
- This option is not valid as the MoE has mandated the District to not only repair the outfall to the AWWTP, but to also put in place a plan to ensure it doesn't break again.
- Not recommended.
- Repair Outfall and keep AWWTP
- Replace outfall and budget for capital projects in the LWMP.
- This option would require an immediate capital investment of 1.2 million to repair the outfall, plus an additional 2.8 million over 5 years to satisfy the LWMP.
- The 45 year old extended aeration plant, even after the capital investment, is still an old technology aged facility that requires significant operational funds to operate.
- Estimated cost: 4.0 million.
- Not recommended.

AIRPORT WASTEWATER

TREATMENT PLANT

- 3. Diversion of AWWTP flows to Town Plant.
- Decommission AWWTP and build a series of lift stations and a force main to send sewer flows into Town Plant.
- Town Plant still has capacity for another 10 years with the AWWTP flows.
- Estimated cost: 6.3 million.
- Recommended option.
- 4. Diversion of AWWTP flows to Town Plant AND Town Plant Upgrades
- Decommission AWWTP and build a series of lift stations and a force main to send sewer flows into Town Plant.
- Upgrades to include removal of the old extended aeration at the Town Plant and new SBR to accommodate future growth.
- Estimated cost: 12.5 million.
- Not recommended... \* unless significant funding partners can be identified.

#### **BENEFITS**

The recommended option #3 of Investing in the Town plant and decommissioning the AWWTP has many benefits. They are as follows:

- 1. Centralized Wastewater operations
- Estimated operational savings of 60 to 100,000 annually with the reduction in maintenance, power/chemical costs.
- A single plant and process to monitor resulting in reduced labor.
- Reduced AWWTP operating costs can be used to fund long-term debt to pay for capital upgrades.

#### 2. Sludge Handling

- Currently there are 2 types of sludge produced by the separate plants.
- The AWWTP sludge is collected and hauled to the Town plant centrifuge at a considerable cost (approximately 30,000 annually).
- Each sludge has its own characteristics and requires different levels of polymer chemicals to de-water resulting in high operational costs.
- Producing a consistent sludge from one-plant will reduce centrifuge operating man-hours and will reduce operating costs.

#### 3. Receiving Waters

- The outfall area for the AWWTP is well-known as a very sensitive shell-fish harvesting area.
- The area has remained closed for a number of years due to contamination from many factors, including the AWWTP outfall.
- Improving water quality and restoring shellfish harvesting is an important goal for both the District and First Nations.
- The conditions for which the AWWTP outfall exists in are some of the worst on Vancouver Island. Strong currents, storm action and a sandy shallow bottom combine for very poor outfall construction conditions.

#### 4. Tacan Industrial Park

- This area of Port Hardy is currently serviced with holding tanks.
- The leaks from the holding tanks are contributing to high fecal-coliform counts in the surrounding streams.
- The new force-main would be able to pick up the Industrial Park and low lying flatlands along Douglas Street that are currently not serviced, creating an environmentally responsible service area that is located in a sensitive ecosystem.

- 5. LWMP and Capital upgrades long-term
- Simplify capital plans and regulatory obligations.
- A single plant, permit and outfall to maintain and life-cycle as opposed to have two of each.
- A single plant allows for a clear and concise capital plan.

#### Committee discussion included:

- benefits for future land development by diverting AWWTP flows to the Tsulquate Wastewater Treatment Plant.
- MOE approvals on the various options provided
- First Nations service agreements and capital cost sharing for utility services
- Requirement to amending the LWMP
- The need to have a engineering study done for: design, estimated cost and to amend the LWMP
- Cost sharing with municipal partners on the study costs
- Partner funding and grant sources

#### Recommendation to Council

Kushner advised signage and bags have been ordered for the Huddlestan Trail and that he will look at the seawall and Robert Scott School area for possible installation sites.

#### STREETLIGHTS

Councillor Huddlestan requested information regarding when streetlights are scheduled for repair, how often and whether there is a set number to be list before repairs are done. T. Kushner advised a list is built and reviewed for priority.
