At that time the Society was advised by A. McCarrick, Director of Financial Services of Policy CP2.7 Grants in Aid / Fee for Service and the September 30 deadline for the upcoming year. Council was advised of the \$1,000 grant recently approved for Port Hardy Minor Hockey and that there was \$1,000 remaining in the grant allocation budget for 2015.

Councillor Pat Corbett-Labatt commented that the letter advised there were five years of previous workshops and suggested contacting the Society to ask if there were extenuating circumstances as to why they did not follow the policy information provided to them in 2014 by the Director of Financial Services.

Mayor Bood advised Council has the choice to approve the request, not approve the request or to table it to another Council meeting.

Councillor Dugas commented that if the North Island Early Child Development Society workshops are a yearly event that they should apply ahead of time

Councillor Hemphill commented that a silver sponsorship with a value of \$250 might be appropriate with a letter advising that proper Grant in Aid policy process is to be followed for any future consideration.

Councillor Robertson commented that if Council tabled the request until the Society advised why they did not follow the policy provided to them Council could put itself in the position of determining if the reason given is good enough.

Councillor Tidbury advised he would be voting against approving sponsorship funding as there is a Grant in Aid policy in place and that the Society had been informed of the process.

Chair Hemphill thanked Eddy Lagrosse and Colleen Hemphill for coming as delegates to the meeting.



Eddy Lagrosse re: Dry New Year's party

Mr. Lagrosse distributed a handout outlining plans for a dry New Year's Eve party where families can come and have fun. It would be a no drug or alcohol event and could include, food, music, karaoke, dancing, music and activities for children.

DELEGATION: E. LAGROSSE RE: DRY **NEW YEARS PARTY**

Mr. Lagrosse commented that in the past there was no organized events for Canada Day and that he, Donna Gault and Joe Pashak, (past councillors for the District of Port Hardy), got involved and planned Canada Day events that carry on today. He further commented that participation by the District of Port Hardy, local First Nations, Port Hardy Secondary School and service groups could help make the dry New Year's Party event a success. Fundraising could be done at upcoming local community events such as Filomi Days. Volunteers are needed to support and organize the event. Mr. Lagrosse commented that he would like to be able to use the Civic Center for the event.

The Committee members discussed the proposed event and agreed that while such an event is out of the Committee's purview it would be good for the community and that they support it in principle. It was suggested to Mr. Lagrosse that he put together budget estimate and present it to local First Nation councils and service clubs for their input and support. Mr. Lagrosse was also advised of the September 30th deadline for Grant in Aid applications to the District of Port Hardy.

Colleen Hemphill, Treaty Negotiator re: UBCM Regional Community to Community Forum Program

Mrs. Hemphill advised the Committee that the December 2014 application for funding a community to community forum (C2C) has been approved by the UBCM Regional Community to Community Forum Program. The C2C will included a cultural orientation session for the new Port Hardy Mayor and councillors, involve three First Nations (Kwakiutl, Quatsino and Gwa'sala-'Nakwaxda'xw Nations) and include a historical overview from Janet Hanuse of the Sacred Wolf Friendship Centre and elders from Kwakiutl, Quatsino and Gwa'sala-'Nakwaxda'xw Nations. A one hour film "How A People Live" will also be shown.

The Committee was advised there was funding \$3,250 from UBCM and \$3,250 in kind from Gwa'sala-'Nakwaxda'xw First Nation. Mrs. Hemphill and the Committee reviewed the proposed budget for the event.

Possible locations and dates for the event were reviewed and it was requested that L. Driemel, recording secretary, check if 9:00am to 1:00 pm on March 25, 2015 is available at the Quatse Stewardship Center. Budget discussion included providing lunch at an estimated minimum cost of \$15 per person, a coffee/nutrition break and honorariums for facilitator Janet Hanuse and participating First Nation elders.

Jeff Long, Director of Corporate and Development Services offered the District's services with logistics for coffee/nutrition break and lunch.


DRAFT TERMS OF REFERENCE

Chair Hemphill advised there has been no prior discussion of the project at Council. Councillor Corbett-Labatt will bring forward a report to Council regarding the sign.

3. Councillor Robertson re: recreation facilities at Beaver Harbour Park

Councillor Fred Robertson advised the Parks and Recreation Review Committee have been looking at the work needed to be done at the ball fields at Beaver

WHEREAS the District of Port Hardy is a full participant in the RDMW Regional Solid Waste Management Service (the 'Service');

AND WHEREAS the Service includes costs of monitoring methane emissions and operating a Bio-cover Methane Emissions Reductions Project (the "Project") which will reduce Greenhouse Gas Emissions in accordance with the Climate Action Charter:

AND WHEREAS the District of Port Hardy and the RDMW are signatories to the Climate Action Charter;

NOW THEREFORE the District of Port Hardy and the RDMW agree as follows:

1.0 DURATION AND TERMINATION

- 1.1 The duration of this Agreement shall be five years commencing on the 1st day of January, 2014 and ending on December 31, 2018 (hereafter "Term").
- 1.2 During the Term, either party may cancel this Agreement by providing 180 days' notice to the other party.
- 1.3 This Agreement may be extended or amended with written confirmation by each of the parties hereto, with the exception of changes by the RDMW to Schedule 'A' as a result of changes to service area population resulting from any service participants withdrawing or being added during the agreement period.
- 1.4 This agreement may be renewed by mutual consent with 90 days written notice prior to the end of the term.

2.0 SERVICES

- 2.1 The RDMW will operate a Bio-cover Methane Emissions Reductions Project at the 7 Mile Regional Landfill and will:
 - a) Provide, by the end of February of each year, the District of Port Hardy with an annual summary report regarding the Greenhouse Gas reduction equivalent (GHGe), expressed in tonnes of 'Carbon Credits', achieved by the Project in the previous calendar year:
 - b) The District's apportionment of the Carbon Credits will be based on their share of the Service area population as noted in Appendix A. The shared portion will be calculated on the Carbon Credits remaining after sufficient Carbon Credits have been applied to offset GHG emissions arising from RDMW operations, including those from operating the project.
 - c) Provide a report showing the final apportionment to all participating Service area partners.
 - d) Upon signing of the agreement, provide the District of Port Hardy with a one-time transfer of 72.3 tonnes Carbon Credits representing Port Hardy's share of reductions from 2012.
- 2.2 The District of Port Hardy will provide the RDMW with a copy of its annual CARIP report prior to the end of March of every year.
 - a) No Apportionment will be released by the RDMW until a copy of the previous year's CARIP report is received.

3.0 OTHER

- 3.1 Carbon Credits have no monetary value and are transferred under this agreement only on the basis of the District of Port Hardy interest in the Project. However, Carbon Credits from this project may be accumulated from previous years as in s2.2 b) or when more Carbon Credits are available from reduction projects than are needed to offset operational emissions.
- 3.2 This agreement is not intended to be legally binding or impose legal obligations on either Party and will have no legal effect.

PURPOSE

This policy is to commit funds to green initiatives in the District of Port Hardy. Carbon offset funds stay within the municipality, and offset annual green house gas (GHG) emissions resulting from municipal operations.

POLICY STATEMENT

The District of Port Hardy signed the British Columbia Climate Action Charter which commits the District to be carbon neutral within its operations by 2012. The District recognizes the importance of carbon neutrality and is working towards achieving this goal without the purchasing of carbon offsets. The intent of this policy is to create a fund that will be used to finance projects within the District that will reduce GHG emissions. The GHG emissions created through the Districts operations will be calculated to establish if the District meets its obligation of carbon neutrality under the BC Climate Action Charter. If carbon neutrality is not met a further calculation will be completed based on a rate provided by a recognized, accredited BC Carbon Offsetter. This will determine the dollar value that would be required to purchase carbon offsets and be carbon neutral. Instead of purchasing carbon offsets this dollar value will be contributed to the District of Port Hardy's Climate Action Carbon Neutral Fund.

CONDITIONS AND OBJECTIVES OF THE FUND

- 1. Reduction of green house gas (GHG) emissions within the District of Port Hardy.
- 2. Retain carbon offset funds for District GHG emission reduction projects.
- 3. Priority for the use of this fund would be given to those projects that have the highest and most immediate effect on reducing GHG emissions.
- 4. Funds will only be used for initiatives that are to achieve a reduction in the Districts GHG emissions. These initiatives will be consistent with climate action goals and objectives. The funds may also be used for the purchase of carbon offsets at the discretion of Council.
- 5. Each year the Districts inventory will be measured to reflect the annual GHG emissions for that year. If carbon neutrality is not met the equivalent dollar value that would be required to purchase offsets will be allocated in the Financial Plan to the Climate Action Carbon Neutral Fund.
- 6. The funds allocated to the Climate Action Carbon Neutral Fund will be recorded in a separate general ledger control account.
- 7. Expenditures authorized from this fund will be included in the Districts Financial Plan.

Re: Nav Canada Assessment Appeal

In January 2011, Nav Canada appealed property assessments for four of their control towers in British Columbia. The board issued a decision to reduce both the land and improvements for the appealed properties to \$20.00. The District of North Saanich has joined the British Columbia Assessment Authority (BCAA) in an appeal to the Board's ruling by way of Stated Case to the BC Supreme Court. This appeal was unsuccessful and the BCAA is appealing that decision to the Court of Appeal. The District of North Saanich is joining BCAA in the appeal. Please see the attached brief for more information.

Our reason for writing you is that your municipality is one of 18 municipalities in B.C. which have Nav Canada properties. If the appeal is not successful, this will have a financial impact on your municipality by way of lost taxation. We request that you consider providing a financial contribution towards this legal proceeding. To date, North Saanich has incurred over \$100,000 in legal costs not including the upcoming appeal. We have applied to the UBCM for financial assistance in the appeal but this assistance, if approved, is limited to a total of \$10,000. The 136 Nav Canada properties located in the 18 municipalities would have generated about \$657,235 of general revenue and \$1.15 million in total property tax revenue in 2014.

Any financial participation you can provide us in this effort would be very much appreciated.

Nav Canada Property Assessment Impact Brief

Background Information

- Nav Canada owns a total of 136 properties in BC with a total 2014 assessed value of \$76.4 million and \$657,235 general revenue tax dollars, \$1.15 million for general/hospital/school combined. Of these properties, Nav Canada has 120 active appeals on various properties they own.
- Nav Canada is a non-profit federal corporation under contract to the federal government to provide aircraft safety and guidance services to airports across the country.
- Nav Canada leases a small portion of the larger airport properties on which the control towers and facilities (mostly communication equipment) are located. The lease rate to the federal Crown and Municipality (owners of the airport properties) is nominal at \$10 annually. The lease also restricts and limits the use of the properties to the provision of the contracted services.
- Nav Canada charges a fee for services to the airport users (primarily airlines) but is limited by its corporate charter to its primary non-profit model.

Property Assessment Appeal Board Decision


- In January 2011 Nav Canada appealed their property assessments for 4 of their control towers.
- In February 2013, the Board issued a decision to reduce both the land and improvement values for the appealed properties to \$10, for a total of \$20 per property.
- The Board considered the following when determining the market value for these special purpose properties:
 - Section 19 of the Assessment Act of BC requires that assessments be at actual or market value;
 - There is no competitive and open market for the properties being appealed; and
 - Both parties agree that the highest and best use of the properties is the current or restricted use.

The Board's decision was based upon finding no market value for these properties, and therefore the decision was consistent with Nav Canada's position that the properties in appeal have nominal value.

It is important to note that the Board's decision did reference the fact that the determination of assessed value in these unique circumstances begs for a legislated solution that does not require forcing appraisal principles and market concepts on properties that do not trade in the market.

Appeal by way of Stated Case Decision

- The Stated Case decision deals with 4 Air Traffic Control towers represented as test cases for the 19 towers found in BC. One of these Traffic Control towers is located in North Saanich. The decision upheld the 2013 PAAB ruling to reduce both the land and improvement values to \$10, for a total value of \$20 per property.
- Following the Stated Case decision, BC Assessment has decided to appeal the BC Supreme Court ruling to the Court of Appeal.

The total 2014 assessed value of the 19 control towers in the province is \$35.2 million. This equates to \$368,992 general revenue tax dollars and \$602,995 for general/hospital/school combined. These 19 properties are directly affected by this decision.

2. Legal Costs

To date the District has incurred \$91,117 in legal costs associated with the Nav Canada appeals and Supreme Court Stated Case.

Recommendation:

A successful appeal to the Supreme Court's ruling on the Nav Canada assessments would not only benefit many municipalities with Nav Canada properties but also those with Ferry Terminals.
