1. <u>5:30 pm</u> Presentation by Dr. Charmaine Enns, MD, MHSc, FRCPC, Medical Health Officer re: Local Health Area Profiles.

The Vancouver Island North Local Health Area Profile 2015 included in the agenda package was received for information.

Dr. Enns gave a PowerPoint presentation titled the Medical Health Officers Report: District of Port Hardy. Information presented to Council included:

- Map of Local Health Area 85.
- Four areas of attention: Mental Health and Substance Use; Seniors/Elders, Housing and Homelessness with the Goal: "Improve the health status of Mount Waddington residents by addressing the factors and issues that affect "health", defined as the spiritual, emotional, physical and mental health of our residents through their life spans."
- Review of population demographic highlights, estimated population growth over next 25 years and influences on life expectancy.
- Statistics on: Comparison of substance use hospitalizations: BC, Island Health, VI North; per capital alcohol consumption from 2015 in local health areas in Island Health; smoking during pregnancy; income and education as determinants of health; socieo-economic index; child development and vulnerability and statistics on hospital admissions for children and youth
- Review of a 2013 Adolescent Health Survey and Youth Protective factors.
- BC OD crisis including opiod OD summary 2016/17.
- Review of factors that determine health.

Deputy Mayor Wishart thanked Dr. Enns for taking the time to come and give an informative presentation to Council.

2. <u>6:00 pm</u> Presentation by Mike Coulter -- CR ATV Club President and RCMP Staff Sgt. Wes Olsen.

Mr. Coulter gave a PowerPoint presentation titled ORV Gateway to the North Island. (ORV – Off Road Vehicle Riding. The presentation included information on:

- The concept of inter-community ORV tourism.
- Utilizing undeveloped Crown land forested areas on Northern Vancouver Island for ORV Riding on thousands of kms of already existing active and de-activated trails and forest service roads.
- 400km Strathcona Loop Map and trails are already used to ride from Campbell River to Sayward – Gold River – Campbell River.
- Riders need fuel, food and overnight accommodations.
- Review of statistics on average ORV tourist and examples of successful trail systems.
- Operation Permits: under the new "BC ORV Act" enacted in Nov 2015 allows the local RCMP Detachment in a specific community, at their discretion. The Operation Permit can allow an appropriately licensed and insured ORV rider to travel on a designated roadway only in a specific community.
- The current Operation Permit process is cumbersome and onerous. If in the future -- Communities are simply able to designate ORV routes within their Community then individual community permits not required.
- Temperate Climate could provide year round ORV tourism potential.
- Review of maps and routes that interconnect many of the communities in the North Island.
- Statistics on the estimated number of quad riders in BC and Western United States and economic impact study on activities involving ATV's.
- There are a number of communities who are participating in a UCBM ORV Local Government Working Group that is managed by: Marie Crawford, Associate Executive Director to lobby for these changes.

Mr. Coulter encouraged Council to lobby the Provincial Government, voice support for this proposal and enable safe and environmentally responsible ORV tourism to be possible.

Deputy Mayor Wishart thanked Mr. Coulter for his informative presentation.

Lightning has been attributed as the cause of the wildfires which have been fueled by dry conditions and strong winds only making the situation worse.

Purchase of New Single Axle Hook Lift Truck

PURPOSE

To request authorization to proceed with the purchase of a new Single Axle Hook Lift Truck from Harbour International Trucks; which will require a change to the 2017-2021 Financial Plan to accommodate for the financial shortfall.

ANALYSIS

A tender requesting bids for the purchase of a single axle hook lift truck (swap loader) was issued on July 11, 2017 with a closing date of August 9, 2017.

The truck will be equipped with the hook lift, snow plow and additional attachments such as a dump body and trash bin. All wiring and hydraulics will be in place for future use for sanding and brining if needed.

The District received 5 bid responses to the tender:

- 1. Bailey Western Star, Sterling & Freightliner Trucks
- 2. Harbour International Trucks
- 3. Inland Kenworth
- 4. Peterbilt Pacific (we received two bids from Peterbilt Pacific, with two different options)

All bids were carefully examined by staff and references of the top two competitive bids were also contacted and interviewed.

Financial Impact

The 2017 capital budget includes \$220,000 for this purchase the recommended adjustment to the financial statement is to accommodate for taxes.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

"THAT Council authorize the award for the Single Axle Hook Lift Truck tender to Harbour International for the tender price of \$244,043.35 (\$217,744 + \$63 Tire Levy + \$10,890.35 GST + \$100 AC Tax + \$15,246 PST). AND FURTHER THAT Council authorizes \$233,153 be borrowed, under section 175 of the Community Charter, from the Municipal Finance Authority, for the purpose of funding the single axle hook lift truck purchase; and *THAT* the loan be repaid within five years, with no rights of renewal. The annual principal and interest payments to be funded as amended in the 2017-2021 financial plan."

PURPOSE

To seek authorization for additional funds due to additional repairs being required.

ANALYSIS

Council recently approved roofing repairs at the curling club and a roofer was sought and then engaged to make the required repairs.

Unfortunately when the roof was opened up some rot and carpenter ants were found in the structure. A professional engineers opinion was sought immediately as it was evident that a previous partial repair had been concealed and the structure could have been compromised. Rather than delay the roofer was instructed to continue re-roofing other areas pending a recommendation from the engineer. It appears the damage was localized. Required repairs will likely cost somewhere in the magnitude of \$50,000.

To prevent further loss and delay the existing roofer was asked to employ his forces to make the required repairs at an additional cost.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Consistent with the previous recommendation funds from the General Capital Reserve fund are proposed to fund the unexpected overage.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

"THAT Council amend the 2017-2021 Financial Plan to provide funds sufficient to complete the repairs to the curling club roof structure."

Repair / Replacement of Unit 20 2009 Ford F550

PURPOSE

To seek council direction and authorization to repair or replace the 2009 Ford F550.

ANALYSIS

The 2009 Ford F550 has experienced engine failure. The engine crankcase was found to contain a significant amount of diesel fuel indicating stuck injectors and or serious wash down past the cylinder rings. Previous notes indicate the dual turbo units were malfunctioning and smoke from oil used to lubricate and cool the turbos had been forced onto the exhaust manifolds. This particular unit had previously been the recipient of a rebuilt engine from Ford and has but 76,000 kilometres in total. Significant metal deposits were found on the engine oil drain plug indicating severe internal damage.

A brief internet search of the Fordparts.com site using this vehicles VIN has shown that a complete replacement engine and both turbos would cost in excess of \$25,000 excluding fuel injectors and ancillary parts and labour. It is likely that Fords cost once removing the cab and other incidentals will exceed \$35,000. Enquiries were made by the mechanic and it does not appear that a suitable used vehicle would be available. Additional concerns with an engine rebuild process would be the additional unknown expenses that could be incurred during the process as it is likely that bolts will break in the disassembly process and that the existing appurtenances (box sander plow etc) will have to be removed. There is also some significant rust on the undercarriage. An engine rebuild could have a two year 60,000 km warranty on the engine. Repair shops in and out of town have been reluctant to engage in an engine rebuild and our own shop lacks the required hoisting equipment.

Another option would be to replace the vehicle - one dealer has indicated a replacement vehicle (2018 dodge 5500 with required equipment) could be had November 1st but would need to know within two weeks due to the high demand going into winter. The cost would be approximately \$120,000 (attachments included) plus tax. If financed through the MFA equipment financing program the annual cost would be approximately \$24,000 per year for five years or roughly equivalent to a 1% tax increase in 2018.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The Equipment Replacement Reserve could finance either. However a new purchase would largely deplete that reserve. If purchased new funds could be borrowed over the next five years increasing taxes in 2018.

Estimated annual cost of Repair over an assumed remaining life of 6 years = \$6,666 Estimated annual cost of New Purchase over an assumed life of 15 years = \$9,000 Estimated annual cost of New Purchase over an assumed life of 20 years = \$6,750

Estimates are initial outlay only and excludes ongoing maintenance which escalate with age of vehicle.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends council choose one of three options:

- 1. Repair the 2009 Ford F550 at a Ford dealership at a cost of up to \$40,000 utilizing equipment replacement reserve funds.
- 2. Replace the 2009 Ford F550 with a new unit after conducting a request for quotes to expedite and using funds from the equipment replacement reserve.
- 3. Replace the 2009 Ford F550 with a new unit after conducting a request for quotes to expedite and using funds authorized in an amount up to \$135,000 to be borrowed under section 175 of the community charter and that the loan be repaid within five years, with no rights of renewal, with the annual principal and interest to be funded from general taxation.

PURPOSE

To present Council with a request by Andrea and Micah Williams to vary the provisions of Zoning Bylaw No. 1010-2013 for the purposes of relaxing the side set back from 1.5 metres (4.92 feet) to 0 metres (0 feet) for the purposes of authorizing the sitting of an existing structure. The existing structure is an accessory building on the South East lot line of 6185 Hunt Street which, pending approval, the applicant will apply further for a building permit to attach the structure to the principle dwelling unit.



REGULATORY AUTHORITY

The Local Government Act (LGA) grants authority to local governments under section 922 (Development Variance Permits) of part 26 "Planning and Land Use Management" to issue a development variance permit that varies the provisions of a bylaw, provided the use or density of the land, a floodplain specification, or a phased development agreement under section 905.1 is not varied.

BACKGROUND

Application for Development Variance Permit which would have the effect of varying Zoning Bylaw No. 1010-2013 to:

1) Reduce the principle use building interior side yard in the R-2 Zone from 1.5 metres to 0 metres on the south-east side of the property located at 6185 Hunt Street.

PUBLIC CONSULTATION

When processing an Application for Development Variance Permit, a notice is prepared and is mailed or hand delivered to the owners and occupiers of property within 50 metres of the property subject to the application (*Local Government Act* and *Development Application Procedures Bylaw*). In this case, notices were mailed to the owners of 9 properties.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff has prepared Development Variance Permit DVP-02-2017 shown on pages 3 and 4 for Council's consideration.

"THAT Council approves Development Variance Permit DVP-02-2017 to vary the provisions of section 6.3 (d) of Port Hardy Zoning Bylaw No. 1010-2013, to: allow for the reduction of the principle use building interior side yard in the R-2 Zone from 1.5 metres to 0 metres on the southeast side of the property for the current structure only.

With respect to the property legally described as Lot 14, Plan 57382, Section 30, Township 6 PID 018-442-897.

AND FURTHER THAT the Director of Corporate Services be authorized to execute the permit accordingly."


The alternative to approving Development Variance Permit 02-2017 would be legal action to remove or reduce the structure from the side yard set back.


