What is an Official Community Plan?

The Province of B.C. Local Government Act (the Act) states that an OCP is a statement of objectives and policies to guide planning and land use decisions within the area covered by the plan, respecting the purposes of local government. The "purpose of local government" are outlined in Part 1 of the Act, and include:

- ✓ providing good government for its community;
- ✓ providing the services and other things that the local government considers necessary or desirable for all or part of its community;
- ✓ providing stewardship of the public assets of its community; and
- ✓ fostering the current future economic, social, and environmental well-being of its community.

Provincial legislation (Local Government Act) outlines the purpose, required content and discretionary content of an Official Community Plan (OCP). The purpose of an OCP, under this legislation, is described as a "statement of objectives and policies to guide decisions on planning and land use management". How does an Official Community Plan (OCP) help us reach our community goals?

An OCP provides a blueprint for decision-making. All municipal policies, plans, and regulations must be in alignment with the OCP. So, it is a valuable guide to support and coordinate all District activities so that the community moves forward in a coordinated fashion. Once adopted by Council, an OCP does not prevent change to the plan based on emergent issues or new information. In this way, an OCP is referred to as a "living document".

Why is our Official Community Plan (OCP) important?

The OCP reflects the community's vision, values and priorities for the long term. By setting out a clear path forward today, we can collectively steer toward a coordinated and planned future that is more sustainable, resilient and provides a high quality of life for everyone.



What is involved in an Official Community Plan (OCP) review?

An Official Community Plan review is an opportunity for Port Hardy to ensure that the vision and goals for the community are still important to the community. Since an official community plan is a long-term guiding document for the future of a community it is important that everything stated in the plan is still relevant to the community and is based on up to date information. So, we will be hosting a series of events for community members and stakeholders to provide their ideas, hopes and values on a range of topics affecting our community.

About the Official Community Plan review...

Starting in February this year, the District of Port Hardy began a review of the Official Community Plan (OCP). Port Hardy's current plan was adopted by Council in 2011. It is important that the plan be reviewed and updated regularly to ensure it continues to reflect the values, vision, and aspirations of the community. The review process is anticipated to take just over one year with the adoption of an Official Community Plan in late 2021.

Key Facts:

OCPs have a structure that applies to each topic or subject area such as the environment for example. Each section includes a list of one or more goals, and one or more objectives related to each goal, followed by one or more policies. It is important to note that OCP policy is different than regulation, like a zoning bylaw for example. OCP policy is meant to inform decision making rather than regulate both for Council and the community in relation to matters contained in the OCP.

One measure of good policy is that it is capable of being actioned by the District and that the outcomes can be measured. Although this is not always achievable, it is a helpful target.

A Sustainability Lens

Sustainability is the ability to meet the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs. A cornerstone of sustainability is the recognition that all aspects of society and the natural environment are interconnected. So, there are four primary realms of sustainability: economic, social, cultural, and environmental. Sustainability planning helps communities realize their visions for a sustainability and provides the framework to integrate sustainability thinking into every day decision-making.

The District of Port Hardy has considered its future through a "sustainability" lens in its current Official Community Plan. Sustainability seeks to identify and speak to economic, cultural, environmental and social components.




Cultural Sustainability:








Visible Minorities











Modes of Transportation

- ✓ Encourage a wide variety of opportunities for people to interact and support community diversity, arts and culture;
- ✓ Create a centrally located thriving arts and cultural hub within the Port Hardy community;
- ✓ Enhance historical and cultural attributes important to the community of Port Hardy and ensure these attributes are acknowledged, celebrated and preserved;
- ✓ Continue to support and enhance existing traditions and celebrations (e.g. Filomi Days); and
- ✓ Ensure cultural elements in Port Hardy are used as focal points for policy and planning efforts to make certain cultural resources are integrated as a component of Port Hardy's path towards sustainability
